The Stone Soup Leadership Institute is a global leader in designing sustainable workforce development initiatives that prepare multicultural youth to become leaders of their lives, and in their communities. Founded in 1997, The Institute has collaborated with business, education, government, and community leaders to develop customized workforce development initiatives that build bridges with marginalized youth who face high inequities in education, employment and life opportunities. The Institute's multi-faceted educational tools, trainings, and place and project- based learning programs are designed to build a sustainable workforce. The Institute's yearlong workforce development program includes: Career Mentor & Job Shadow Day Program, College Prep & Community Service Program, Leadership Series and our Youth Leadership Sustainability Summit.

The Institute's Job Shadow Day Program is a 3-month program that exposes young people to the world of work by meeting with professionals and learn about their career journeys. Originally developed in partnership with the San Francisco Chamber of Commerce in the early 90's, it has had a tremendous impact on high school and community college students nationwide. This is a pivotal time in students' lives to expand their thinking about possible career opportunities and to influence their decision-making process about their future education. Since 2020 we've tailored this seminal program to invest in the transition to a sustainable economy with a Green Job Shadow Day and a Blue Job Shadow Day. We invite students to explore sustainable career pathways by matching them with sustainability practitioners in a wide variety of fields.

Our youth-community leadership initiatives accelerate the development of "21st Century Skills" vital for jobs of tomorrow. Our personalized tools train young people in "soft skills" and real-world situations to be servant leaders: powerful communicators, able to lead and work on teams, adaptable to the demands of various settings, able to problem solve, to think critically about issues, to resolve conflicts that arise and utilize project management skills to get work done.

Taking initiative in one's life is especially critical for systematically disenfranchised communities in inner cities, rural areas and in island communities. If we want to level the playing field and offer all people regardless of race, class and gender the opportunity to succeed, then these soft skills must need be integrated into education down to the core. With the Institute's guidance, young people overcome seemingly insurmountable obstacles to achieve their goals of graduating from high school and college, landing dream jobs and bettering their communities. From the inner cities of Boston, Cincinnati, Holyoke, and Oakland to the islands of Hawaii, Martha's Vineyard, Vieques, Puerto Rico; and Virgin Gorda, British Virgin Islands -- our graduates are successful doctors, lawyers, entrepreneurs, engineers, tech and blue-green companies.

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The Institute's Job Shadow Day program was conducted with schools on three islands: Hawaii, Lanai and Oahu. This 3-month program culminates with a one-day life-changing experience — it helps translate youth passion with practical experience in the job market. We give youth a positive experience of the world of work, promote a good work ethic, and develop long-lasting relationships that contribute to the island and global economy. Youth are strategically matched for a day with business, government and academic professionals so they have first-hand experience about jobs in their fields of interest. SHYLI workshops prepare students to maximize these mentoring experiences. Youth research potential career pathways aligned with their personal and professional dreams. They learn first-hand about being a leader in today's world. SHYLI is helping to build a local green workforce. SHYLI's goal is to give young people an opportunity to learn about sustainable career pathways to 21st century. From engineers and marine biologists to tech/computer science coding, sustainability takes a whole village of people with a wide variety of jobs and careers!

The Institute's Performance Metrics

The Institute's Performance Metrics Self-Assessments measures the program impact on skills essential to the 21st century job market, such as communication, teamwork, conflict resolution, problem solving, adaptability, critical thinking and project management. We prepare weekly reports on each youth tracking their attendance, grades, community service hours, mentor's feedback, portfolios, our online tools used and essays written. We balance the quantitative numbers with qualitative information from youth essays about their experiences and progress.

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
